How to enjoy yourself at the library

Well, there are of course several methods to make sure that you get the most out of your visits to the library. But first it is important to choose the right library. If on the other hand, the weather outside is grey and rainy, I might play a popular ditty like "Oh By Jingo". What you choose to play is as I said before up to you. You'll find that your audience doesn't expect a live music performance in the library. Some of your listeners might start pointing at the "silence" signs on the walls, but don't let that stop you. Give your audience what they most of all want. You'll also find that the librarian will start approaching you with a threatening look in his or her face, but don't let that alarm you. Librarians are not by nature violent people (that's why they became librarians) and they will probably not be able to hurt you, unless, of course, they use some kind of weapon. Once a librarian tried to hit me in the head with Encyclopedia Britannica, and that did somewhat make the experience a bit less enjoyable.
